Damascus Way Reentry Center provides reentry leadership and services using a Christ-Centered approach.

Our core service model supports residents with: a stable housing pathway, employment and career readiness programming, and healthy community connections—all aiming at reversing the cycle of recidivism.

Presentation was by director Nick Abbott.



Nick presented statistics on the number of people they serve and some of the troubles they have had with the law. This included his own bio of meeting the Law. No

Nick says the most common denominator with the people they serve is the lack of a good role model in their life.

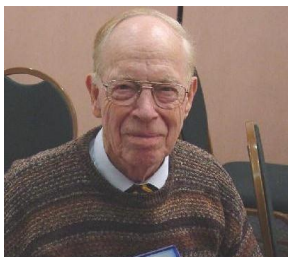
Damascus is a local non-profit. Details can be found on Google as well as how to obtain help.

They attempt to provide stable housing. It appears their organization provides help to men, not women.

Damascus constantly needs mentors and prayer, says Nick. A resident can be in the facility for up to 18 months.
