She is also the vice president of 4-H Horse Project Development Committee (HPDC). In Jessica's 13 years of 4-H, she has been active in the following projects: Photography - 13 years, Horse - 9 years, and Dog - 4 years. On the 4-H club level, Jessica has served as one of the leaders of the Salem Sailors 4-H horse project since 3rd grade and when she was active with the dog project, she was the leader for her group. Through 4-H, Jessica has participated in many community service projects. For her 4-H Club, she has offered assistance to members who are interested in the dog and horse projects. When asked what other activities Jessica has been involved with, she said, "For the last three years, I have brought at least one horse up to the State Fair to represent Olmsted County. While at the state fair in 2015, I won my

keyhole class, received 4th in the training program, and our drill team placed 7th. I brought photography twice and a craft once. Every year I have received a blue ribbon. At the County level, I have earned the title Grand Champion in Photography twice. Jessica said, "My favorite 4-H activity has been being involved in the horse project. Every year I feel like I have grown significantly and learned how to have patience, work hard, and celebrate small successes. The horse project has taught me how to accept defeat and learn from my experiences. "I have worked diligently to convince my parents that I was ready to train my own horse. We looked all summer and into the fall for a weanling or a yearling. When I had almost given up hope, I found Chance. For the last three years, I have been training Chance and found the experience very rewarding. He trusts me fully and has always been willing listen to my commands." In being chosen 4-H Youth Leader of the Month, Jessica said, "This is nearly my last year in 4-H. I am aspiring to become a neurosurgeon and feel that being Leader of the Month will promote my presence in 4-H. I want to continue helping others recognize the importance of 4-H and how they will learn leadership and how to expect the best from themselves" When asked about her hobbies, Jessica said, "I have two main hobbies, riding horse and wood burning. In Johanna's 12 years of 4-H, she has been active in the following projects: Swine - 12 years, Crafts and Fine Arts - 12 years, Photography - 11 years, Clothes You Make and Fashion Revue - 6 years,

Demonstrations/Performing Arts - 5 years, Goat - 2 years. On the 4-H club level, Johanna has served as President, Vice President, Secretary and Reporter. Johanna said, "My duties as an officer require me to help in organizing events for our club. I have also taken one of our monthly meetings and organized a fun activity after the meeting." Another way that Johanna helps the county 4-H program is by judging herdsmanship, helping to set and take down the swine show ring, and help at the Farm Bureau Scavenger Hunt during the County Fair. Johanna reaches out to younger members and assists them with their fair projects, especially swine & goats. When asked what other 4-H activities she has participated in, Johanna said, "I have participated in many other 4-H activities such as attending 4-H camp. I have attended livestock encampment for State Fair for the past six years and attended non-livestock for four years." When asked if she could highlight one event or experience, Johanna said, "The biggest 4-H highlight for me was showing animals. This past year at fair was a very rewarding fair. I spend numerous hours outside working with my pigs and goats for the week of fair. I started showing goats just 3 short years ago. When fair finally came around I was ready to show off what
