# Steve Borchardt

Return visit----We were pleased to have Steve back to update us on the status of affordable Housing in Rochester. As before, he had

statistics to illustrate his points in the progress of this very complicated problem. Steve says that a person needs to be making \$22.60/hr in his example of ablity to buy 'Affordable Housing' in the Rochester market. Steve says that 65% in our area earn less than this. He used the example of single mom with 2 kids. He tries to get some solution for people like this.

Getting the financing for builders is one of the major hurdles. The costs of construction are nearly the same for any builder, so the financing is a variable they can work with to some extent. Currently there are 33 sales available in the county at \$200,000 or under. 6000 new apartments have been built in Rochester the last 3 years. The lowest rental in these is about \$1200/ mo. We want to watch this perceived problem over the next years for innovation in housing.
