was introduced by Scott and Mary Oesterle. Sue is development person for the Hastings Veterans Home. She gave a great picture of the scope and needs of veterans with emphasis on Minnesota. She says there are 5

veterans' facilities in MN with 3 more on the drawing board. As I understood it, these are run by the states with support from the federal government. At Hastings most of the residents are there because of PTSD or drug problems. In order to be a resident, they must have some medical problem. Sue made the statement that there are enough facilities for these vets 'if they want them'. Most come from either a homeless or jail situation. Residents are not 'forced' to come to the facilities, but they have to 'want' to be there for food and shelter.

Hastings has a full medical staff. However, staffing is still a problem when there are private medical facilities of quality in the area. All their residents are seen 'daily.' Depending on the vets problem, he or she might be capable of working in a small business in the area. Some have work release kinds of jobs. This helps in the rehab of the vets.

Sue says that the care veterans receive is not free. They must be contributing something to their own support.

50% have never been married.

Average age is 55

Only one female patient in Hastings presently.

Approx. 145 residents.

Sue's job is "fund raiser" for things like transportation vehicle (bus) for local trips and job transport.

People are free to 'visit'. Go, have a picnic and stay and visit. The residents like the contact.

Sue stressed in closing, that the help is available if only they want and accept the care. They can't force them.


