School-Within-a-School

Ken (?) teacher at Mayo, presented a program on a program that RPS is testing out at Mayo H.S. The District will consider the value of continuing and/or expanding as time goes on. Ken brought 4 of his students for a Q&A session after his description of what the program is trying to do. These students are hand picked when staff feels that they have potential but not achieving. They have to be satisfactory in discipline and attendance, but lacking in progress in scholarship. The student has to 'want' to be a part of





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this program. It is a class where the Teacher comes to the class rather than the other way around. Two teachers are "home teachers", so stay with the class and cross teach. The staff will pick about 25 students for the class. It is voluntary, but competitive to get into it. They will teach 9-12 grade classes, so each class is progressive. The kids become "family" and great friends. The four kids present recommend that all schools have a similar program. These were all well spoken and blunt. Some would 'tear up' in their expression of appreciation. They needed some funds for year end party (which wouldn't come from the District this year) so, our Club gave them a \$200 check to continue that activity.

Human trafficking. We all think that it has nothing to do with me,

but we are wrong. I've heard two or three programs on the topic and still can't tell you much about it. Rose tried to explain how it is something that can affect most of us in very subtle ways. Besides sex trafficking, there are other aspects that

we can see around us in work and school. Rose says their main mission in Mission 21 has not changed; our priority is restoring child victims of sex trafficking. That is their heartbeat and always will be. Secondly, their goal is to do prevention education for youth. Before they graduate from high school.

Some of the predictors making one vulnerable to trafficking as well as other negative paths in life, are poverty, drugs, abusive parents or other older persons, and unstable home life. Internet has contributed to the breakdown in maturation to adulthood. Males between 30-50 are most likely to be involved in the propagation and procurement of sex services.

It is a breakdown of 'humanity' to other humans. This was a quality program, but not an 'upper.'

Wrap up of Food for Kidz

2019 from Mary Brouillard, Stewartville Kiwanis:

16th Annual Food For Kidz 2019 Wrapup - April 6, 2019

Volunteers

415 (520 in 2018) volunteers including 148 (185 in 2018), from the Kiwanis family.

It was hard to determine <u>exactly</u> how many from the various clubs were there as some just put Sunrisers or Kiwanis down. All 8 clubs were represented as were





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Lake City, Stewartville, John Marshall, and
Kingsland Key Clubs and Stewartville Builders Club and
Lake City Aktion Club. The Kinglsand girls
basketball and football teams were a HUGE help. The Army
volunteers were a FANTASTIC help again as
were the men from Teen Challenge. Kohls came through
with 10 volunteers, enough to get 2 grants of
\$500 each. We had volunteers from Girl and Boy Scouts, 4H, churches, schools, businesses and many
individuals and families - all ages and sizes!

Meals:

Total meals - 164,000 meals (174,648 in 2018) packed (3rd highest food pack event in our 16 years)
13.8 pallets of rice and bean meals were packed (11,880 meals per pallet)
FFK has earmarked this food pack for countries in Africa.
Two of the pallets will be given to Channel One
Food Shelf in Rochester.

Meals made to date: 1,842,172 in 16 years

This year we took in \$24,001.40 (\$22,835.60 in 2018) which was enough to pack 160,009 meals. All but 2 clubs made or exceeded the individual club goal of \$2,000. The crew from Food for Kidz let us keep packing because the need for food is so great. They brought enough ingredients for 170,000 meals to pack. We stopped packing and began shutting down at about 3:40 to facilitate the FFK crew getting out of town by about 4:30. They have at least a 2.5 hour drive to Stewart.

Thanks to all the Kiwanis family for this great effort to make our Kiwanis One Day of Service a success. Special thanks to all who came early for the extra help in setting up, the Rochester Daymakers and Sunrisers for helping with the organization of refreshments and the Spring Valley Kiwanis for the help with the organization of the day including setup, cleanup and extra long shifts, the Stewartville Club for the long hours they put in to the day, any who worked

extra shifts and those who stayed to help clean up. The day began at about 7:30 a.m. and the mopping was done and doors locked at 4:45 p.m.
